I have listed the only article I have found below to support the story. Caveat, most stories from Dad's side of the family prove true. This one eludes me. Now it is up for your consideration.

Did our Huguenot ancestors celebrate Christmas? Dad said yes. I descend from the Remy Family, and this is what was said.

Christmas, or the Christ Mass was started by the Catholic Church in the mid-300 A.D. period as the church's way to confront the pagan winter celebrations. When St. Remy baptized Clovis I in 508 A.D. Clovis became Catholic. In 509 A.D. Clovis I united the Frank Tribes under what we know as France. One of Clovis' first acts of leadership was to make Christmas a national holiday.

Christmas was celebrated in France on the 12 days between December 25th and January 6th, the Feast of the Epiphany. The biggest and best part of the celebration was food.


Following graduation, she pursued stints in banking and advertising. She enjoyed a career in Interior Design in Athens and Columbus, Georgia.


